The R.D. Richardson Memorial Construction Materials Laboratory

Last spring semester, the family of R.D. Richardson made a \$50,000 donation to the School of Construction Management (SOCM) naming the materials laboratory "The R. D. Richardson Memorial Construction Materials Laboratory." Proceeds from this endowment will be used to support both students and laboratory activities. "This donation was given to the School of Construction Management in honor of R. D. Richardson and his legacy in the construction industry," stated Richard David Richardson, grandson of R. D. Richardson and 1998 graduate of the SOCM. "He grew up in construction and loved it. It was in his blood," stated Robert Beryl Richardson, grandson of R. D. Richardson and 1999 SOCM Alumnus.

R. D. Richardson was born in Chatham, LA on October 20, 1930. He completed grade school and later worked for the Louisiana Highway Department, Operating Engineers Local 406, and various highway and utility contractors, furthering his education in the highway and municipal construction industry.

On September 20, 1967, R. D. Richardson and his brother, A. H. Richardson, Jr., purchased a rubber- tired backhoe, a pickup truck, and a trailer and thus began D & J Construction Company, Inc., in West Monroe, LA, with R. D Richardson as President and A. H. Richardson, Jr. as Secretary–Treasurer. The name D & J Construction Company, Inc. was formed by the initials of the co-founders Robert David Richardson and Almer H. Richardson, Jr. D stands for David and J stands for Jr.

On December 31, 1986, the two brothers sold D & J Construction Company, Inc. to Richard Richardson, R. D. Richardson's son, who had been with the company since the beginning.

Gary was born in Winnsboro, LA and after high school sports received scholarship to the University of Southwestern Louisiana (USL). Early in the spring

of the second year a knee injury ended any hopes of playing collegiate football. Gary returned back to his home town and enrolled in the construction program at ULM. He knew that construction was in his blood from the early days of working small construction jobs with his dad, so it was only natural that Gary followed that path.

"ULM was more than a foundation for my career in construction, but also a foundation in life," stated Gary. He met his wife (Cindy Cyr, Dec. 79) of 28 years in Professor George Hutchinson's conceptional estimating class. They have become business partners as well as life partners and have two children, Michael (26), who is living in Japan and teaching English, and

Ashley (17), a junior at Parkview
Baptist in Baton Rouge. Upon
graduating from ULM in December
1979, Gary moved to Houston,
TX and joined the rank and file of
Brown & Root, where he was a cost
engineer on a Petro Chemical Project
in Deer Park just outside of Houston.
After completing that assignment, he
was reassigned to Gonzales, LA as
the chief cost engineer with a staff
of six cost engineers on what was
then one of Brown & Root's super

projects, the Texaco Refinery expansion. But there was one thing missing in his business experience. He wanted his own construction company, but knew that an industrial type construction company would take millions of dollars and a lot of luck. One he had none of and the other only a little. He continued to keep up with ULM and several of his fellow alumni with an occasional phone call to Professor Hutchinson who remained on the ULM faculty.

One day in 1982, Professor Hutchinson called Gary to tell him that he had accepted a position with Tudor Construction Company as vice president, and he asked if he would be interested in a project manager position on the Jimmy Swaggart Ministries Campus in Baton Rouge, LA. Gary

knew that this was his opportunity to get into the commercial construction business, so he accepted the position. He remained there for four years, but his entrepreneurial spirit kept prompting him to get his building contractor's license and prompting him to go into business for himself.

Gary's longtime goal finally happened, and ThornCo was formed in 1996 as a specialty contractor. ThornCo's primary goal was simple: to develop a reputation of excellence among demanding general contractors and building owners by completing projects in a timely basis, at reasonable rates, while offering the highest quality available in the industry. DEAR FELLOW ALUMNI

At the spring meeting of the Industry Advisory Council (IAC) held April 18, 2008, discussions were held about the renovation work that is being done this summer to the interior of the School of Construction Management office area. The work involves the removal of vinyl wall covering, preparation of the walls, painting of the walls and new carpet and vinyl base board. There was also discussion about replacement of countertops and some furniture. This area is used by the faculty. More importantly, construction companies that hire our graduates hold interviews in this area and we want this area to have a professional and current look.

A motion was made by the IAC to ask the alumni of the ULM/NLU School of Construction Management to make an annual contribution to the School of Construction Management. These funds would be used as the department needed them for equipment, furniture, etc. The director, Dr. Parker, would present a list of needs to the IAC during the fall and spring meetings and would provide a full accounting of these contributions annually.

We are requesting that you use the forms (alumni and/or corporate) included in this newsletter when sending in your contribution, your company's direct contribution, or your company's matching contribution. You can specify whether you want your contribution(s) to go to the Potts Fund where only the interest can be spent or to the Building Fund which can be accessed as the director and department need funding. The Potts Fund has a principal balance of approximately \$130,000. It is a goal to get this fund to \$1,000,000 within the next several years. At a 4% rate of return that would produce \$40,000 that the department could spend each year. Any expenditure from the Potts Fund must be approved by a motion of the IAC.

Remember, these contributions are for improvements to the facility and for equipment needs of the department. The State is funding less for public universities and the money needed to enhance this program is going to have to come from the private sector.

Every graduate of this program has had the opportunity to make a very good living from their education earned from this program. It is now time to give back to the School of Construction Management. We are asking you for a minimum contribution of \$200 annually but will accept any amount, larger or smaller, that you wish to contribute. All contributions are tax deductible and the people in charge will be good stewards of your contributions.

Along with Dr. Parker, the faculty, and students, I thank you in advance for your contributions.


