Course Description: An overview and an examination of the basics of classification and counseling approaches, emphasizing interpersonal skills development, data collection, interviewing, assessment techniques, and counseling. Prerequisite: 101, 270, and junior standing or approval of the program director.

Course Objectives:

- Evaluate past, present, and future trends pertaining to the development and use of classification and counseling approaches within the institutional and community-based setting.
- Apply theories from multiple disciplines (criminology, psychology, and counseling) to the investigation of micro and macro level issues pertinent to the offending population.
- Critically evaluate current qualitative and quantitative research pertaining to offender assessment, counseling, corrections and treatment.
- Evaluate past, present, and future trends pertaining to the development of various specialized offenders, including the juvenile offender.

Course Text: Hanser, R. D. (2007). *Special needs offenders in the community*. Upper Saddle River, NJ: Prentice Hall.

Instructional Methods

This course will be entirely on-line using the university Blackboard system. Students will maintain an ongoing “discussion” each week in response to a theme question that is presented by the instructor. The “discussion board” section of the course Blackboard website will be used extensively for this purpose. All other assignments will either be completed by e-mail submission or on-line submission within the website itself.

Course Exams and Assignments

Exams: There will be two (2) exams in this course – a Midterm Exam and a Final Exam. Both exams may consist of any combination of multiple-choice, true-false, fill in the blank, short answer, and or essay style questions at the instructor’s discretion.

Practitioner Interview: These assignments are intended to provide the student with some exposure to the real world of correctional treatment. Students will interview a therapist or treatment provider in the community and will write a two-page (double spaced and typed) report on their interview. Practitioner interviews are due by 8:00 a.m. of April 23rd, 2007. Late practitioner interviews will be given a penalty of 25 points.

Course Assignment Weighting: A student's overall course grade will be determined and weighted according to the following composition:

Discussion Board Assignments: These assignments are (On Blackboard course menu click on COMMUNICATION, then click on DISCUSSION) given throughout the semester and allow the student to demonstrate their understanding of the assigned material in an open-ended essay format. Do note that the posting must be provided by midnight of the due date or the student will receive no credit for the submission.

Likewise, students will need to respond to the postings of other students. Each student should provide at least two other postings to their fellow class members if they expect to gain full credit for the week.

The instructor will post each question(s) the night prior to the beginning of the week. Students will only have 7 days to respond to the questions or issues

presented. Students will not be allowed to progress ahead of the class schedule with weekly assignments. Also, there will be no exceptions to the timely completion of the weekly Discussion Board assignments.

Course Grading System: The final course grade, as well as all tests, papers and projects assigned throughout the semester, will be based on the typical letter grade system as follows:
