ACPE CONCERNS RESULT IN PROGRAM IMPROVEMENTS

Over the past months the ULM School of Pharmacy has faced many unforeseen obstacles. We have made great progress in overcoming these obstacles and will continue to move forward, turning this into an opportunity to strengthen our position as Louisiana's only state-supported pharmacy program.

In June 2017 our pharmacy school, while remaining fully accredited, was placed on probationary status by ACPE, our governing body. The concerns expressed by ACPE were in no way related to the quality of education offered to our students, nor the degrees offered by our institution, but were focused on organizational, administrative and financial issues. As the only State-supported pharmacy program, Louisiana's budget crisis and the cuts to higher education have, in turn, impacted our program. Most of the concerns expressed by ACPE could be attributed to this. The higher administrative body of our university and our

pharmacy administration has worked diligently to rectify all concerns.

Some of the steps being taken include revising the administrative organizational structure, making salaries within the pharmacy program more competitive to increase faculty retention and recruitment, and establishing a comprehensive curricular plan for the Interprofessional Education Program that is in its infancy within our program.

All necessary resources have been dedicated to this endeavor and Dean Anderson, our faculty, and other administrative officers are confident that the steps being taken will not only resolve the probationary issues with ACPE, but also strengthen our program as a whole as we move forward into the future.

ULM PHARM.D. ALUMNUS CREATES SCHOLARSHIP WITH \$60,000 CONTRIBUTION

University of Louisiana Monroe's College of Health and Pharmaceutical Sciences continues with great achievements.

Just recently, on Oct. 18, the college held a press conference announcing an agreement between ULM and a Shreveport company to license an olive oil-based nutraceutical developed by a ULM pharmacy professor.

Monday, the same college held a check presentation to recognize an alumnus' \$60,000 contribution toward a superior graduate scholarship that will support Doctor of Pharmacy students.

The contribution was made by Dr. Salvador "Sal" Scaccia who received his Pharm.D. from ULM in 2002, which was the first Doctor of Pharmacy graduating class at ULM.

Scaccia said the scholarship is very important to him as a way to give back to his alma mater for the gratitude and the successes he has made in his pharmacy career.

"I want to be able to give other students the same or even better opportunities for success," said Scaccia. "Giving back and doing our part to better the world is an important concept that we should focus on and try to make happen every day."

The Louisiana State Board of Regents offers matching opportunities for specific university endowments, including superior graduate scholarships. Scaccia's gift will be submitted in the form of a proposal to the Louisiana State BOR to receive a competitive match of \$40,000 to create a \$100,000 endowed superior graduate scholarship that will create funds in perpetuity. The scholarship will be named the TLC-Dr. Salvador Scaccia Endowed Superior Scholarship for Doctor of Pharmacy at the University of Louisiana Monroe.

Dr. Glenn Anderson, Dean of the College of Health and Pharmaceutical Sciences, expressed his gratitude to Scaccia adding that education takes commitment, including time, the energy to go through challenging courses and the finances that students' families have to come up with to support their children through their college years.

"These kinds of gifts that go through perpetuity where you're able to help those students reduce that debt-load not only helps them, but helps the community that we serve and the communities our alumni serve," said Anderson.

Scaccia said his time at ULM prepared him for the real world, adding that he left ULM as a more experienced, educated and confident young man ready to conquer the world.

"The friendships and bonds that I made at ULM are lifelong," said Scaccia. "Education was top-notch. The educators were challenging, yet caring, and the family atmosphere in the College of Pharmacy was an experience that was unique and fulfilling."

About Dr. Scaccia:

After graduation from the University of Louisiana Monroe, Dr. Salvador Scaccia started as the head retail pharmacist in an independent community pharmacy before beginning his tenure in specialty pharmacy in 2005. In 2008, Scaccia opened Total Life Care Rx Pharmacy, today known as Kroger Specialty Pharmacy. Here, he serves as Senior Vice President and oversees more than 450 employees across Louisiana, Texas, and California.

He is currently on the Board of Directors of the New Orleans Pharmacy Museum, and he has also served as president of the Greater New Orleans Pharmacy Association for 10 years.

In November 2010, Scaccia was honored by Gambit Magazine of New Orleans as one of the top 40 people under the age of 40 for his accomplishments and

contributions that he has made to New Orleans in the area of business. He was also recognized by the Young Leadership Council (YLC) of New Orleans in July 2017 as a Role Model for his being an extraordinary example for the young professionals of New Orleans and the community at large in his respective profession.


ULM PHARMACY RESEARCHERS LINK OLIVE OIL TO PREVENTING CANCER, ALZHEIMER'S

In the summer of 1965, a team of researchers at the University of Florida formulated a carbohydrate-electrolyte beverage to help their football players cope with heat and heat-related illnesses. Since the university football team is the Florida Gators, they named the breakthrough thirst-quenching beverage Gatorade.

Today, two researchers at the University of Louisiana Monroe are developing a product which they believe could have an even greater benefit – prevention of two of humanity's most devastating illnesses, cancer and Alzheimer's disease. Since 2009, Professor Khalid El Sayed, Ph.D., and Associate Professor Amal Kaddoumi, Ph. D., of the Basic Pharmaceutical Sciences Department of the ULM School of Pharmacy, have worked on a project to develop an olive oil-based food supplement to help prevent cancer and Alzheimer's disease.

The El Sayed-Kaddoumi project is titled "Novel extra-virgin olive oil-based functional food for cancer and Alzheimer's disease prevention." It focuses on extracting and testing the effects of oleocanthal, one of the most active compounds of olive oil.

"Our recent studies showed that oleocanthal selectively suppressed several human breast cancer cell lines," El Sayed said. "In addition to its cancer preventive and control activity, oleocanthal has also

demonstrated an anti-Alzheimer's disease activity and we also found evidence for its potential to reduce the risk of Alzheimer's disease."

Kaddoumi said she is confident their oleocanthal-based product could prevent cancer and Alzheimer's if taken early enough.

"We are very optimistic in terms of prevention because the mice experiments we conducted show that the earlier you give this compound, the more efficient the outcome will be," Kaddoumi said.

Next step: developing an oral delivery method

The experiments with mice were conducted by injecting them with extracted oleocanthal. Now the scientists are developing a way for humans to take oleocanthal by mouth. This could be an instant powder beverage or a capsule.

The oral form would be tested on mice to see if it produces the same preventive effects as the injectable extract.

If that testing is successful, the human trials could begin.

"In other words, we have to prove the same effect on humans," El Sayed said. "We are optimistic that we will have the product out on the market. However, clinical trials are necessary to prove that we can apply it to humans, and those are often very expensive and time-consuming." La. Board of Regents backs research

Kaddoumi and El Sayed recently partnered with Segue Therapeutics, owned by Dr. James Cardelli, a retired 30-year LSU Health Science Center-Shreveport faculty member, who will provide \$22,500 over a three-year period for the project.

"Segue Therapeutics considers this a project that can potentially

be commercialized and have a very good outcome," El Sayed said. "This collaboration is very important because it allows us to secure more funds."

Due to their collaboration with Segue Therapeutics, the researchers have recently secured something much bigger, a \$225,000 award from the Louisiana Board of Regents Industry Ties Research Subprogram. It covers three years beginning July 1.

After reviewing 28 research proposals requesting a total of \$2,489,579 in funding, the Board of Regents categorized seven proposals, including ULM's, as "Priority One: Highly Meritorious Proposals Recommended for Funding."

ULM's project was further ranked number one, ahead of other institutes in Louisiana, including LSU, University of Louisiana Lafayette and Tulane Medical School.

The board described El Sayed, Kaddoumi and Cardelli as "three

investigators with extensive and distinguished publication records who form an excellent research group with evidence of productivity in the field."

"This award is a great accomplishment and it will help us develop, test and promote our olive oil-based product, especially because we filed a patent on novel isolation and therapeutic application methods," El Sayed said.

Kaddoumi and El Sayed, in collaboration with Cardelli, hope three years from now to have their product available as a dietary food supplement capsule and an instant dry powder drink.

The financial potential of the olive oil product is clearly enormous. To put it in perspective, today Gatorade has 75 percent of the sports drink market in the United States. Worldwide, the company topped \$3.3 billion in sales in 2016.

However, the prospect of preventing

cancer and Alzheimer's is priceless.

COP MTM SERVICE FREES TIME FOR COMMUNITY PHARMACISTS

The ULM College of Pharmacy has partnered with some local pharmacies to provide Medication Therapy Management (MTM) to their patients. With the busy demands placed on retail pharmacists, pharmacies are often short on time and staff to devote sufficient time to medication management. These pharmacies are now utilizing the skills and time of some of the ULM College of Pharmacy P4 students, under the direction of Dr. Laurel Sampognaro and other pharmacy faculty, to assist in meeting the needs of these patients.

All of our professional pharmacy students are trained to use Mirixa, a web-based clinical platform, developed to deliver standardized patient care services that may also increase Star Ratings. Students learn the basics of the platform during their integrated lab sequences but,

for those students participating in this particular rotation, more extensive training is given. Once they have completed training, the students then provide case reviews and work directly with the patients via telephone. Many patients are receptive to this help, but students also gain experience in dealing with some of the more difficult patients.

One local pharmacy utilizing this service is Aron's Pharmacy in Monroe. Our group handles approximately 8 – 10 cases for Aron's each month. This service frees up Mr. Aron and his employees so they can focus on filling customer prescriptions, assisting patients, handling insurance issues and providing their customers with better service.

ULM PHARMACY PROFESSOR RECEIVES \$10,000 DONATION FOR BREAST CANCER RESEARCH

The Louisiana Cancer Foundation (LCF) presented ULM College of Pharmacy Professor Dr. Paul Sylvester with a check for \$10,000 in continued support of his breast cancer research on Jan. 26.

Sylvester has received funding from the LCF to support his cancer research for more than a decade, for a combined total of \$107,500.

“Once again, I am honored and humbled by the generosity of the Louisiana Cancer Foundation and their continued support of our breast cancer research conducted in the ULM School of Pharmacy,” said Sylvester. “Gifts such as this are extremely important in maintaining our efforts and progress, and provide a means by which we can obtain important equipment and supplies required to advance our studies. I recently had the opportunity to meet and talk with the Foundation Board members and they are an extraordinary group of people that I cannot thank enough for everything they do in the fight against cancer and support of cancer patient care in our community.”

Sylvester, the Pfizer Endowed Professor of Pharmacology and ULM Director of Graduate Studies and Research, has taught at ULM for over 18 years. He has spent many years researching the relationship between nutrition and breast cancer growth and development, and the effects of tocotrienols—a rare form of Vitamin E that displays potent anticancer activity.

In November of 2016, he was named the recipient of a \$600,000 estate gift from Mildred Maurer, a breast cancer survivor who had developed a keen interest in the breast cancer research of Dr. Paul Sylvester before her passing.

The Louisiana Cancer Foundation was founded in 1999 by the Northeast Louisiana Cancer Institute for the purpose of increasing public awareness, early detection, treatment, and research for cancer in the state.

ULM REORGANIZES THE COLLEGE OF HEALTH & PHARMACEUTICAL SCIENCES

Effective July 1, 2018, The University of Louisiana will restructure its internal college organization with the creation of two new colleges.

Currently, ULM is organized into the College of Arts, Education & Sciences, the College of Business & Social Sciences, and the College of Health & Pharmaceutical Sciences.

The new reorganization leaves the other colleges untouched, but it will divide the College of Health & Pharmaceutical Sciences into two separate colleges, the College of Pharmacy and the College of Health Sciences.

Dean of the College of Health & Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dr. Glenn Anderson explains, “The restructuring is primarily to address concerns by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education and will go towards removing the probationary status imposed by the ACPE in June of 2017.”

Anderson further explains, “With the reorganization, the pharmacy dean will be better able to lead the College of Pharmacy’s educational mission, to represent the College to Alumni, and to advocate for pharmacy care reform in the State.”

The School of Pharmacy’s organizational structure has been a source of concern for the American Council on Pharmacy Education (ACPE) since the College of Pharmaceutical Sciences, College of Nursing, and College of Health Sciences were combined in 2014.

Dr. Eric Pani, Vice President for Academic Affairs commented, “I am pleased that ULM has managed its financial matters so that this action is possible now and look forward to working with the deans toward a successful future.”

The College of Pharmacy will contain two schools, the School of Basic Pharmaceutical Sciences and Toxicology and the School of Clinical Sciences. Anderson will transition to the new dean of College of Pharmacy.

The College of Health Sciences will contain the Kitty Degree School of Nursing and the School of Allied Health. A nationwide search is underway for the Dean of the College of Health Sciences.



The President's Academy at the University of Louisiana Monroe concluded its sixth year as a renowned college preparatory program for academically excelling high school students, June 24-28.

The five-day program partners with regional employers to provide select high school scholars a real-world experience in one of several career paths. This year, students were able to work with drone technology in the new unmanned aerial systems course. Students can also gain experience in the fields of law, computer science, health science and physical science.

"The President's Academy gave participants unparalleled access to career opportunities with innovative companies located in northeast Louisiana. It was exciting to watch their interest in these careers blossom over the course of just one week," said President's Academy Director Dr. Joshua Stockley.

Companies participating in the academy were CenturyLink, Universal Health Conway, St. Francis Medical Center, P&S Surgical, Escamilla and Poneck LLP, ANGUS Chemical Company, Monroe Surgical Hospital and the Ouachita Council on Aging.

Students learned both on and off campus during the President's Academy. While excursions to local real-world work sites immersed students in the career paths of their



choice, in-course lessons, lectures and lab experiments allowed them to get a taste of what's to come during their college years.

Teamwork is a significant part of the academy as well. Students are divided into "X-Teams" to develop an action plan and solution to combat a fictional pandemic, which is presented to them at the beginning of the week.

"The pandemic project we were presented with, while challenging, was very interesting and taught our team to use each of our special abilities to teach one another," said Alaina Edwards, a participant in the medical science program of the academy.

On the final day of the academy, students present their solution to a panel of judges. The winning group

receives a scholarship that is applied to their upcoming semester at the university.

"I was impressed, and the judges were impressed, by their ability to rise to the challenge in such a short time. These students are assuredly going to be among our next group of difference makers," Stockley said.

All students attending the academy receive a one-hour college credit. This year, 44 students attended from Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, Arkansas and Georgia.

The American Pharmacist Association (APhA) held its 3rd annual Institute on Alcoholism and Drug Dependencies from June 1- 4, 2017 in Salt Lake City, Utah. Four student pharmacists and one School of Pharmacy (SOP) faculty member attended and represented the University of Louisiana at Monroe (ULM). The conference focuses on the rising trend in both alcohol and substance abuse disorders and the ways to recognize and combat these serious diseases. Experts in the field of addiction and recovery, as well as healthcare professionals who have personally experienced a substance abuse disorder and subsequently recovered, shared their knowledge and experiences. The conference also incorporates the highly successful twelve step programs of Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, and Al-Anon at the end of each day. Conference attendees get to experience as well as participate in these unique groups. Finally, the institute highlights the important role that the pharmacy profession can play in reducing the harm from substance abuse disorders and contributing to the recovery of those afflicted with the disease.

The overall message for the conference is threefold; addiction can occur in anyone regardless of profession or social standing, substance abuse disorder is a chronic disease that requires lifelong treatment, and the stigma of addiction prevents many people from asking for and receiving the help they need.

Dr. Aaron Head hit the ground running after receiving his degree in May 2017. Right after graduation he and fiancé, Chelsie Morein (Pharm.D. candidate '18,) found time to travel abroad to help those less fortunate before rushing home in time to begin his PGY1 residency.

As a very recent alum, I have just returned from my first ever "event" as a new Doctor of Pharmacy graduate.

For the past 2 weeks, Chelsie Morein (PharmD candidate 2018 & fiancé) and I have been working with Health Talents International on one of their medical/ surgical mission trips in Guatemala. It was truly a rewarding experience in many ways. A team of about 60 people converged on the Mayan town of Montellano near the pacific coast of Guatemala. Among us were ENTs, OBGYNs, and general surgeons; anesthesiologists, CRNAs, nurses, translators, caregivers, physical therapists, and 2 representatives from the field of pharmacy.

It was quickly apparent they were not use to having pharmacists accompany their surgery clinics, but we were quickly folded into the duties most suitable to our field. We inventoried all drugs arriving from the U.S. into their own supply. Close to 50,000 tablets, capsules, vials, and ampules were counted. Most mornings we would disembark with the clinic's mobile medical team where we would transition into more of an ambulatory care type of practice. We would go out to even more remote Mayan villages to find candidates for future surgeries, and

medically manage HTN, T2DM, etc. We quickly found our niche amongst the mobile teams. During down time we would watch surgeries, and occasionally get to scrub in and hold protractors. During one of the surgeries, I did pass out safely. I do not believe the syncope event was related to what I was seeing.

But regardless, I'm glad I chose the route as a pharmacist, because clearly, I would not have cut it as a surgeon! All-in-all, about 60 surgeries were performed and approximately 200 total people were helped during our stay in Guatemala. I would highly recommend this company and trip for any readers or anyone looking for a glimpse into the medical field as a career.

Back state side, I now prepare for a move to Arkansas for a PGY1 residency at UAMS-NW in Fayetteville.

I am very excited and blessed for what the field of pharmacy has in-store for me next. I could definitely get use to the international pharmacy life!


