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Shreveport Campus Update



DR. JILL COMEAU Associate Professor of Clinical Sciences Shreveport Campus

Dr. Jill Comeau is an Associate Professor of Clinical Sciences and a board-certified hematology and oncology clinical pharmacist. Her current practice site is at the Feist-Weiller Cancer Center (FWCC) at Ochsner LSU-Health in Shreveport, LA. FWCC serves over 24,000 patients a year. Her expertise is in lung, head and neck, and GI cancers. Along with her students and pharmacy residents, she provides medication-based knowledge and skills to assist physicians in providing optimal cancer care. This includes selecting medications to prevent and treat side effects caused by cancer and cancer treatments. Her pharmacy team

also provides medication education to patients who are diagnosed with these cancers. Since FWCC is a safety net cancer center, she serves many underserved patients, including those with Medicare, Medicaid, or are uninsured. The pharmacy students are pivotal to patient care in her clinic, because patients tend to feel more comfortable and are more forthcoming with their questions and medication issues. In addition, students can build relationships with the patients and impact their quality of life.

Having ULM faculty and students has changed our clinics in more ways than I can count. The opportunity to interact with colleagues who are an essential part of the team is invaluable. By working side-by-side with physicians, students are an indispensable resource to the medical team. While I do not have exact numbers, pharmacy students counseling patients, reviewing their home medications, and following up with patients who have recently started chemotherapy has improved patient care and their quality of life. As an attending, having PharmDs and PharmD students available to discuss cancer treatment plans including cancer, nausea, and pain medications, has made me a better physician.

Working with pharmacists and pharmacy students is highly advantageous in many ways. Pharmacists are highly trained healthcare professionals who possess extensive knowledge about medications and their effects on the body. They provide valuable insights into the appropriate use of medications, drug interactions, and adverse events. This is especially useful when I work with pharmacists collaboratively side by side in the clinic. They help me reconcile medications, dose chemotherapy, and obtain clinical histories. This makes my work more efficient and optimizes patient outcomes and ensures that medications are used safely and effectively.

Pharmacy students bring a fresh perspective to the field of pharmacy, are eager to learn and contribute to the profession. Working with pharmacy students is an opportunity for me to mentor and train the next generation of pharmacists, helping them develop the knowledge and skills they need to succeed in their career. Additionally, pharmacy students can bring new ideas and innovative solutions to the table, which can help to improve the quality of care and patient outcomes.


Biomedical Research & Innovation Park comes to Monroe.

On November 1, 2022, the broundbreaking of the Biomedical Research & Innovation Park (BRIP) was held on the south parking lot of the College of Pharmacy. The facility will be targeted at partnering with private businesses to develop and commercialize biomedical technologies and spinout technologies in pharmacology and other disciplines. BRIP's vision calls for significant evolution of our campus with increased investment in infrastructure forthcoming (see image).

The first phase of the BRIP is the creation of roads, utility access, and construction of the first BRIP building on our Bienville campus. The Innovation Center will be built at the corner of Bienville and Tower Roads. This \$30 Million project has been financially supported by the Ouachita Economic Development Corporation, Ouachita Parish Police Jury, the Louisiana Economic Development, EDA grants, legislative appropriations, and LA Capital outlay.

The Louisiana Cancer Foundation continued their support of ULM's Paul Sylvester, Ph.D. with a \$10,000 donation to support Sylvester's breast cancer research. The donation made on November 8 marks the 17th year that the LCF has donated to Sylvester's work, bringing the total amount donated to \$170,000 over that time.

The check was presented to Sylvester by members of LCF board. The donation will help Sylvester continue his research of tocotrienols. a rare natural

form of vitamin E that has displayed potent anticancer effects.

Sylvester, an endocrinologist, joined the ULM College of Pharmacy in 2001. He is the Associate Dean of Research and Pfizer, Inc. B.J. Robison Endowed Professor of Pharmacology.

The LCF also supports ULM with an endowed scholarship for a student who is a cancer survivor or has been impacted by cancer in their family.

Established in 2019 with a \$50,000 endowment, the LCF increased the scholarship by \$5,000 in 2021. In the Kitty DeGree School of Nursing, the LCF has donated \$30,000 to the Theresa Marsala Memorial Endowed Nursing Fund and \$22,450 for oncology classes.

ULM receives \$200K in matching funds from LA Board of Regents

The University of Louisiana Monroe is delighted to share that the Louisiana Board of Regents Sponsored Programs Support Fund has awarded \$200,000 in matching funds for three Endowed Superior Graduate Scholarships established within the College of Pharmacy, two First Generation Endowed Scholarships and an Endowed Professorship.

Dr. Paul Sylvester, Associate Dean of Research in the ULM College of Pharmacy, wrote the #1 ranked competitive proposal for the Endowed Superior Graduate Scholarships.

Fundraising for the Bill and Marsha Bourn Endowed Superior Graduate Scholarship was initiated by Kenneth and Ann Wilson, who are alumni of the ULM College of Pharmacy (class of 1984 and 1985, respectively), along with other friends and alumni in honor of Bill and Marsha Bourn. Bill and Marsha were married for 53 years, until her unforeseen death in October 2017. Bill and Marsha have three daughters, all of whom graduated from ULM. One of their daughters is a pharmacist working in a retail pharmacy, as is her husband who is also a ULM Pharmacy alumnus. Their remaining daughters are twins, one of which has an earned degree in toxicology, while the other has an earned degree in nursing. Bill Bourn served as Dean of the ULM College of Pharmacy for 18 years, between 1986 and 2003. In 1991, Bill founded the "Dufilho Society," an endowed fund for the support and advancement of the ULM College of Pharmacy. After his retirement, Bill remained an active presence in the College. Recipients of the Bill and Marsha Bourn Scholarship are enrolled in the PharmD and/or PhD program and have an interest in pharmacy education and aspirations of a career in Pharmacy Administration.

The Louisiana Independent Pharmacist Association (LIPA)Endowed Superior Graduate Scholarship supports third- and fourth-year professional students who are pursuing the PharmD/MBA degree. The recipients of this scholarship should have an interest in independent pharmacy entrepreneurship within the healthcare practice of Pharmacy.

Steven and LeAnn Boyd established the Causey-Boyd Endowed Scholarship, to honor Nolton W. Causey, Jr and his impact to the profession of pharmacy, his community, and future generations of pharmacists. Nolton W. Causey, Jr, alumni of the ULM College of Pharmacy (class of 1969) served the Natchitoches community as a dedicated and well-loved independent community pharmacist for nearly 50 years. Additionally, throughout his career he was an active member of the Louisiana Pharmacist Association (LPA) and a founding member of the Louisiana Independent Pharmacist Association (LIPA). Nolton's middle daughter, LeAnn Causey Boyd, alumni of the ULM College of Pharmacy (class of 2002) along with her husband Steven T. Boyd, pharmacist, worked alongside Nolton in the family's pharmacies and businesses. In 2015, Nolton, LeAnn, and Steve founded the first Pharmacy Benefit Manager in the State of Louisiana built on a transparent business model. Nolton's grandson and LeAnn's son, Landon, is also a ULM alumnus. Recipients of this scholarship have an interest in making positive impacts in their communities through entrepreneurship and the practice of pharmacy.

The purpose of First Generation Endowed Scholarships is to increase college access and success for low-income first-generation students, enhance institutional efforts to provide needbased aid to undergraduate students, and provide additional opportunities for benefactors to support the University of Louisiana Monroe.

Local entrepreneur Merlin Reiser decided to up the game and create the Merlin Reiser Super First Generation Scholarship for ULM students. Merlin Reiser had \$6,000 in his bank account when he moved his young family to Monroe, Louisiana, to open the community's first Sonic drive-in in 1977. As a growing franchise business,

Sonic provided tremendous opportunity for this entrepreneur looking to grow. And grow it did. Over the next four decades, The Reiser Group became one of the largest franchisees within the Sonic system with 38 locations throughout Louisiana, Alabama, Florida and Texas. Now retired, Merlin enjoys looking for ways to give back to the communities that supported his business, particularly where education is concerned.

With the use of his retirement excess campaign funds, Justice Marcus Clark (Ret.) made a gift to establish the Justice Marcus Clark First Generation Endowed Scholarship. Marcus Clark is a retired State Supreme Court Justice who has devoted his life to public service. He is from Sulphur, Louisiana and is a 1978 graduate of ULM with a degree in Criminal Justice. He is very pleased to be able to help his university by supporting the renovation of the Honors Lounge as well as endowing a scholarship for first generation students.

The purpose of an Endowed Professorship is to strengthen instruction and research by helping to recruit and retain superior faculty aligned with the campus' role, scope, mission, and strategic priorities.

Carole Kilpatrick, wife of Tex Kilpatrick, established the Tex Kilpatrick Endowed Professorship in Kinesiology. Tex Kilpatrick's service to ULM was extensive and included participating in the selection of two ULM Presidents, serving as Vice President of the ULM Foundation, and co-chairing, with special friends Lynn and James Moore, the fundraising drive to build Bon Aire, the ULM President's official residence

ULM's product enters the health aging market.

Almost five years ago, ULM entered into a licensing arrangement with Oleolive Inc, a private biotechnology company, to develop the marketing and commercialization of Dr. Khalid El Sayed's research on the health benefits of olive oil. Dr. El Sayed's research isolated oleocanthal, a phenolic compound found in trace amounts in olive oil and demonstrated oleocanthal's contribution to the health beneficial properties of extra virgin olive oil (EVOO).

The result is a product that has been branded Oligen.

Kiley Grant, CEO of Oleolive claims, "Oligen has been in the works for more than five years. Our partnership with ULM has resulted in more than \$5 million in additional grant funding and millions more in private equity investment."

ULM's Office of Innovation and Research noted how the process has also included protecting the intellectual property while expanding the potential for commercialization. Chief Innovation and Research Officer John W. Sutherlin, PhD, remarked, "What Dr. El Sayed did in the laboratory was the critical first step of this effort. Working with Oleolive was the next step."

Grant added, "Working closely with ULM researchers, especially Dr. Khalid El Sayed, Oleolive has done extensive testing before going to the market in order to gain the trust of consumers in that our product is of the highest grade possible with documented benefits. We stand behind all of the claims made."

ULM President Ron Berry commented, "Few universities can claim to bring products to market. What our faculty and staff have accomplished is remarkable."

The research regarding oleocanthal has been extensive. Thousands of articles from universities and other publications around the world have demonstrated for years the benefits of oleocanthal as well as other polyphenols found in EVOO. ULM's role in facilitating this research has been crucial, especially as it relates to health matters related to those getting older.

Jim Cardelli, PhD and Chief Technology Officer of Oleolive, sees the promise in healthy aging for those using the product. He stated, "Promoting the effects of Oligen has been based on the vast amount of supportive peer-reviewed science publications. This product has decades of scientific health-based support."

University of Louisiana at Monroe Harm Reduction Education and Referral for Opioid Overdose Reversal (ULM H.E.R.O.) Program aims to provided first responders and key community organizations evidence-based educational programs on opioid reversal medications to reduce opioid overdose rates and increase referrals to treatment recovery centers in the greater Orleans Parish and Ouachita Parish. Both Parishes have and are surrounded by highly underserved populations that are high in medical need with poor access to healthcare.

Our first objective is the creation of an adaptable risk-reduction curriculum tailored to different types of first responders that meet the unique needs of the state of Louisiana. This includes addressing stigma regarding opioid use, review of Louisiana legislation, how to use and teach how to use opioid reversal medications, and test strips, and building a network between first responders and local treatment/recover centers in the area. Our second objective is to educate at least 2,000

first responders by September 30th, 2026. And our third objective for this goal is to increase our collaborations with local treatment and recovery centers by 80%.

Our secondary goal is to implement evidence based educational programs for community first responders (such as people who use drugs or people who may witness and respond to an overdose) with the objective of hosting 50 community events providing risk reduction education directly in underserved communities.

And finally, our tertiary goal is to effectively educate and train student first responders in healthcare programs to expand our reach into communities of need. We selected this unique population because students training in healthcare in our state typically stay within our state and come from rural, underserved parishes. Our objective is to provide harm reduction education to at least 800 first responders-in-training by September 30, 2026.



The US Department of Health and Human Services Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration awarded a \$2.5 million grant to Dr. Alexis Horace, ULM associate professor of clinical practice, for harm reduction education.

Faculty at the ULM College of Pharmacy and Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine, Louisiana Campus are highly trained individuals in education who are passionate about the opioid epidemic and are eager to bring awareness to underserved communities. The number of people served will be 500 people the first year, 750 people the second and third years, and 1000 people the fourth year

The ULM HERO team finished providing Harm Reduction Education Class to firefighters in Fire District 13 in St. Tammany Parish from May 8th – May 10th! This was our first group of first responders to educate, and we have more sessions planned for this summer.






